Focus of the Internship	Introduce intern to the care of sick, injured, and adult or juvenile wildlife
	and certain non-natives.

	Learn what is involved in rehabilitating an animal in preparation for

Qualifications/Requirements for Intern Applicants	 Able to tolerate outdoor environment with high humidity for duration of shift. Able to meet the requirements outlined in the Essential Capabilities document with or without reasonable accommodation. Able to learn and demonstrate a familiarity with the SFWC's programs. Able to understand policies and positions regarding animal protection issues and able and willing to represent those policies when interacting appropriately and accurately with the public or otherwise representing
	 to the SFWC. Must be at least 18 years old. Must submit the required paperwork and pass a background check before being assigned. Must learn and follow all guidelines and policies of the SFWC, and follow directions given by staff.
Restrictions	 Must wear closed-toed shoes, an SFWC shirt that is provided, and follow the SFWC dress code. Hair must be tied back. Must work in designated area, no entering other habitats. No cologne/perfume. Should have access to a computer and ability to login into an online volunteer communication site to receive updates. Interns who wish to work with rabies vector species in rehabilitative care must receive pre-exposure rabies inoculation (not paid for by

Internship Time Commitment	Minimum 24 hours per week for 12 weeks
